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# A Message from the President



## Dear friends,

Dear Members of the Society of British Neurological Surgeons, July 2023.

I hope this message finds you all in good health and high spirits. I am delighted to share some updates and important developments within our society. The Spring Conference held in Cork was a resounding success, attracting a large attendance and featuring a strong academic program. We were honoured to have esteemed international speakers, including Michael McDermott, Russ Andrews, Sebastien Froelich, and Ossama Al-Mefty, grace the event. Moreover, it was a pleasure to meet Micheál Martin, the former Taoiseach, who captivated us with a perfectly timed speech, delivered without the aid of any PowerPoint slides.

Through my experiences as a trainer and in my recent involvement at a national level, I have come to realise the significant stress and challenges faced by neurosurgeons in the course of their duties. Difficult operations, complex clinical communications, issues within the workplaces, including with colleagues, can generate great angst. In light of this, I am pleased to announce that the SBNS has established an independent and confidential Support Line to assist any SBNS member seeking advice. Emily Borhan, with her legal background, will provide this invaluable service. You can reach Emily

at <u>professionalsupport@sbns.org.uk</u> or by calling 07498 322935. I encourage all members to take advantage of this resource, as I believe it will be tremendously helpful.

The ongoing impasse between the government and the British Medical Association (BMA) regarding the Junior Doctors contract is distressing for both patients and doctors alike. Industrial action by consultants has already posed further challenges. I sincerely hope that the negotiating parties can engage in productive discussions and reach compromise agreements without delay, in the best interests of all stakeholders involved.

On another important matter, after careful consideration and extensive discussions at Council, the SBNS has written to all Acute Trusts to express our patient safety concerns regarding the omission of routine lumbar puncture from the investigative pathway for patients with suspected subarachnoid haemorrhage and a negative CT head within six hours of the ictus. Consequently, NICE has reopened discussions with us to review this aspect of the guidelines. This is a significant development, and we will actively contribute to ensuring patient safety in this area.

I am thrilled to announce that, after several years of collaborative effort by a multispecialty group, including several neurosurgeons, the GMC has published the Curriculum for training in Mechanical Thrombectomy. This curriculum, accessible here.

This represents a milestone in providing the necessary training opportunities across the UK for this crucial service that greatly benefits our patients. I encourage senior trainees and CCT holders who may wish to acquire expertise in this technique to read this curriculum. I envisage training opportunities to arise over the next year.

David Cumming (Spinal Surgeon, Ipswich) has been appointed as the National Clinical Director for Neurosurgery and Spinal Surgery with Nick Phillips appointed as the National Clinical Lead for neurosurgery. The CRG is



considering Low Volume High Complexity procedures, including important questions regarding the definition of LVHC operations, the decision-making process for case selection, and the appropriate locations and surgeons for performing such procedures. Paul Grundy has previously dedicated extensive work to these matters, with input from numerous UK consultants. Given the evolving nature of this process, I believe regional discussions will be necessary to ensure an optimal model for service delivery.

It brings me great pleasure to recognise the outstanding work undertaken by Surajit Basu since assuming the role of Honorary Treasurer, both of the SBNS and TNF (The British Journal of Neurosurgery). As a result, we have identified funds that will allow us to significantly increase our

Bursary Grants, aimed at assisting our trainees in visiting international units to develop expertise and gain experience that may not be readily available in their training schemes. We are currently working on ensuring equal opportunities for all trainees, and information regarding this will be provided on our website in due course. I would also like to acknowledge Nigel Mendoza's diligent efforts as Vice President (Global Affairs) in developing a network for those interested in global neurosurgical experiences. This initiative is particularly important considering the limited access to neurosurgery in many parts of the world. Thanks to a generous bequest from the Karter/Jenkins family, we are implementing this vision.

I am pleased to share that Simon Cudlip has been elected to Council and is responsible for enhancing our social media presence. This development promises improved and more rapid communication, keeping our members informed and engaged. I believe this will be an invaluable platform for fostering collaboration and exchanging ideas.

I have been fortunate to attend the Spanish Neurosurgical Society (in Santander) and the celebration of 75 years of neurosurgery in Aberdeen. Both were enjoyable meetings. I learned that neurosurgery has been undertaken for at least 100 years in Aberdeen with James Learmonth being one of the founding members of the SBNS, hosting an SBNS meeting in 1934 in Aberdeen with an academic programme alongside a social programme. Our heritage is rich and longstanding.

Heartfelt congratulations are in order for Peter Hutchinson, who has been elected as President Elect. I had the privilege of working with Peter or "Hutch" as many of you know him, during our training in Cambridge in the 1990s. I am truly enjoying our close collaboration as members of Council, and I have witnessed first-hand Peter's prolific contributions to academic neurosurgery at an international level over the past two decades. As he assumes the role of President in the Autumn Meeting of 2024, I am confident that his leadership and vision will be a tremendous asset as we approach the 100-year anniversary of our esteemed society in 2026.

I would also like to extend my congratulations to Ian Kamaly-Asl, who has been elected as the RCS England Representative, Crispin Wigfield as the Honorary Secretary, and Andy King as the Spine and Neurosurgery CRG co-opted member: I am sure all will provide dedicated service. I express my sincere thanks to Alistair Jenkins and Paul Grundy for their services to the SBNS in their current roles as Immediate Past President and Honorary Secretary. Both have worked tirelessly for the Society on many facets over many years: thank you.

In closing, I would like to express my gratitude to all the members who participated in the recent elections. Your involvement is crucial in shaping the future of our society. Together, we can navigate challenges, seize opportunities, and advance the field of neurological surgery for the benefit of our patients.

## President Elect – Prof. Peter Hutchinson September 2023 - 2024

## Prof. Nihal Gurusinghe - MBE

Congratulations to Nihal on receiving an MBE in King Charles III's 2023 New Year's Honours List in recognition of his contribution to Charitable Services.

Nihal has been closely involved with three registered charities: the Sydney Driscoll Neuroscience Foundation (SDNF), which helps support high quality training for doctors and nurses working in the neurosciences (with a particular focus in brain cancer research), the Midland International Buddhist Association (MIBA) and the International Buddhist Relief Organisation (IBRO), which provides relief for victims of natural disasters such as the tsunami in Asia, as well as sightless persons and refugees of conflicts.

Nihal has also played an active part in the SBNS. He was Honorary Secretary 2000 -2005. He was re-elected on to council in 2006 and has been there ever since! His current role on council is as our NICE Co-ordinator, facilitating the development of guidelines relating to neurosurgical practice, which he commenced in 2011. Nihal's dedication to the charities with whom he works, coupled with his kindness and generosity, makes him a worthy recipient of this honour. We had hoped to have a photo of him proudly wearing his award, but the presentation has been delayed until October. Hopefully he will proudly wear it at the Gala dinner in Edinburgh in April 2024.



### **SBNS Medal**

The SBNS Medal was awarded to Myles Gibson OBE in March 2023 for his services to Neurosurgery.

Myles was formerly neurosurgeon to the Queen Mother and a registrar to Hugh Cairns. He also worked hard for Royal Army Medical Corps and continues to lecture around the world.

He set up two neurosurgical units in the Yorkshire region, Leeds and Pinderfields (before Pinderfields Wakefield was integrated into Leeds).

He was to be presented with the medal at the gala dinner during the SBNS Cork Meeting, but unfortunately was unable to travel. Thankfully his former friends and colleagues from Leeds rallied round and presented it to him in the comfort of his home and with the marvels of modern technology the memorable occasion was filmed and shown at the Cork Meeting. Myles was delighted to receive the prestigious award.



### Norman Dott Medal Winner

This year's Norman Dott Medal was awarded to Siddharth Vankipuram by the Intercollegiate Specialty Board in Neurosurgery for the most outstanding performance at the Intercollegiate Specialty Examinations in Neurosurgery in 2022. The medal was first awarded in 1995 and the previous winners have all gone on to be high achievers in Neurosurgery. As well as receiving the Medal he will also receive the Marjorie Newsome Senior Fellowship which consists of an all-expenses paid (up to £5,000) visit to the Barrow Institute, Phoenix, Arizona for up to 6 weeks (min 3 weeks) and to attend the AANS congress or equivalent.



### Jr. Neurosurgical Award - National Selection

Conor Keogh achieved the highest National Selection score in 2023. This is an amazing achievement as competition is high. The highest scorer is doubly rewarded as they also receive the Junior Barrow Foundation UK Travel Fellowship. The Fellowship is supported by Barrow Foundation UK. The award is for up to £3,000 to visit the Barrow Neurological Institute in Phoenix, Arizona for two weeks.

# What Does the SBNS Ever do for us???

### **SBNS Bursaries**

The SBNS currently awards various types of bursaries of which members may or may not be aware of. At a recent Officers Meeting it was decided that the SBNS could do more for our trainees and UK medical undergraduates and decided to add some additional awards.

## 1 Elective Bursaries

The SBNS currently supports 10 bursaries to facilitate neurosurgery electives for UK medical students. We have now increased this to 14 bursaries of £500 each pa.

## 2 Assistance to attend National and International Conferences as a Speaker

A new bursary for trainee neurosurgeons and neurosurgery hospital trust grades in the UK. The SBNS will award 10 £500 bursaries a year to facilitate attendance at national and international conferences (awarded by application on merit).

## 3 International Fellowship Bursary

A new bursary for UK trainees travelling abroad for fellowships. Two £2,000 bursaries will be available annually.

## 4 SBNS President's Bursary

Finally, at our recent Council meeting in July, it was agreed that an SBNS President's Bursary will also be available. This prestigious prize will be awarded to deserving applicants from categories not represented above. This bursary will be to support work of exceptional value, innovation or research. The total annual value of this bursary is £2,500. This could be awarded to an individual or may be shared between several applicants. It will be awarded by the SBNS President on merit via an application to the President.

All bursary applications will be competitive. They will be awarded twice a year. Please encourage juniors to apply. More details will be sent to members and also placed on the SBNS website. # **SBNS National Mentoring Scheme**



I am really excited to announce the launch of the SBNS National Mentoring Scheme. The SBNS national mentoring scheme has been developed as a response to worrying levels of oppressive behaviour within neurosurgery. One of recommendations of the Kennedy Report into diversity, equity and inclusion by the Royal College of Surgeons of England was to support mentoring in surgical practice. The scheme is therefore an investment by the SBNS in its members to promote support and wellbeing for all.

The scheme uses the PushFar mentoring platform which will co-ordinate and organise the mentoring relationships.

## Why a Mentoring Scheme?

**Neurosurgical National Survey 2022** 

- 65% felt they had been a victim of bullying, undermining or harassment
- 70% had witnessed bullying, undermining or harassment
- 73% reported feeling uncomfortable about being open/expressing themselves in the workplace

Estimated cost of bullying to NHS of £2.281 million pa.

Burnout (syndrome characterised by emotional exhaustion, depersonalisation and reduced sense of personal accomplishment) is experienced by 25%-57% of neurosurgeons.

There are high levels of mental health concerns and addiction but very poor levels of seeking help with these issues in surgeons.

Proven benefits for productivity, retention, satisfaction, inclusion and empowerment with mentoring schemes. This is for both the mentees and mentors taking part.


We have set up the SBNS neurosurgery mentoring scheme using the PushFar mentoring platform. This is not what one might consider the traditional surgical mentor relationship but a more focused relationship of support and development that often is just on a short-term basis. This will provide a confidential process with a peer to facilitate career progress, encouragement and a feeling of being valued.

The scheme will be open to anyone within neurosurgery. It was initially targeted at junior consultants but clearly is open and has value for everyone within neurosurgery. Please do sign up and encourage colleagues to sign up as both mentees and mentors. There is online training and support through the PushFar platform. Currently the platform is open for mentees and mentors to approach each other to match, so once registered, approach colleagues through the platform to request a mentoring relationship. If people are reluctant we might start making mentoring suggestions through the platform. In these challenging times, this is a real opportunity for us to support

each other as a neurosurgical community.

# Realist Spine Course – Teasdale Simulation Suite



On the 18th of May 2023 the Institute of Neurological Sciences ran its first Realist Spine course in the recently opened Teasdale Simulation Suite in Glasgow. Junior neurosurgical trainees simulated Transforaminal Lumbar Interbody Fusion (TLIF) and navigation-guided lumbar spine instrumentation on high-fidelity RealSpine models.

The course was very well received with 100% of trainees in attendance stating they found it useful.

They hope to repeat the course next year.

# Calling All Budding Reserachers – Do You Have An Idea For A Clincial Trial?

Got an idea for a neurosurgery trial? The academic committee can help!

We are looking for research suggestions to submit to NIHR. If these are prioritised the NIHR will advertise a commissioned call for that research to which the neurosurgery community can apply. A recent example is the role of thromboprophylaxis in brain injury that led to the recently funded TOPS-TBI trial (in development).

Neurosurgery has benefited from huge NIHR support for clinical trials, many of which have changed clinical practice. The BASICS trials showed that antibiotic shunts reduce infection. DexCSDH showed dexamethasone causes more harm than benefit in chronic subdural haematoma.

# National Institute for Health and Care Research

NIHR considers that a good trial will be:

- Important to the patients and/or public and NHS
- Supported by current evidence
- Of high scientific quality
- Feasible to deliver
- Good value for money
- Timely...the research will continue to be relevant following study completion

The PICO format is a good place to start developing a trial, for example:

Population: patient having a VP shunt Intervention: antibiotic or silver shunt

Comparator: standard shunt Outcome: time to shunt infection

# **SBNS Global Neurosurgery Initiative**

The SBNS is delighted to announce the establishment of a Global Neurosurgery Initiative.

Why Neurosurgery? Surely there are more pressing global health needs?

In fact, the burden of death and disability from unmet surgical need is five times that of the three main disease burdens, TB, AIDS and malaria, put together; head injury, hydrocephalus and spina bifida are a significant part of this, while most tumours and haemorrhage do not come anywhere near a surgeon. Since the Lancet Commission in 2015 threw a spotlight on the disparity of access to safe surgery, anaesthetics and obstetrics between low and middle income countries (LMICs) and more developed nations, there has been a marked increase in interest as to how high income countries may be able to contribute to this global problem. It has been estimated that an extra 23,000 trained Neurosurgeons are required to meet the unmet need in neurosurgical care by the year 2030.

The SBNS Global Neurosurgery Initiative will focus on the three main areas of research, training and education, extending the work and vision of Mr William Harkness who along with Professor James Johnson founded InterSurgeon.

A national survey undertaken by Mr Simon Thomson and Mr Will Bolton along with separate contacts made through the SBNS has established that already many units and individual Consultant Neurosurgeons are actively involved in neurosurgical training in LMICs, but to date there has been no national network of potential collaboration. As a start we have created a list of these interested units and surgeons with contact details, which has been placed under the Global Neurosurgery section of the SBNS website. Whilst there is much on the Internet with regard to neurosurgical education with webinars and educational videos, we would like to establish more formal training relationships and partnerships. As a starting point we would encourage those who are interested to establish international monthly Multidisciplinary Team meetings where patients may be presented from both units with ideas and thoughts exchanged.

In the future, with partnerships established, the aim would be to bring trainee Neurosurgeons to the United Kingdom for a period of up to three to six months with funding through the Diana and Alan Karter Foundation, which has been set up to support such activity. We have also written to the chief executives of several hotel chains to ask for their support by providing accommodation.

The NIHR has already established worldwide links with regards to research and patient databases (e.g. traumatic brain injury). In particular, research of this nature would help inform future health policy in LMICs and perhaps address some more difficult but pertinent questions as to the value of neurosurgery as compared to other healthcare and socioeconomic needs.

As a global initiative it is recognised that the SBNS cannot work alone, and we look forward to establishing further collaboration and links with the Royal Colleges, the European Association of Neurosurgeons, World Federation of Neurosurgeons and InterSurgeon.





Everyone who attended and presented at the SBNS Spring meeting this year will, I am sure, agree that it was a great success, both academically and socially. It was held at the Clayton Hotel, Silver Springs Conference Centre, in a beautiful part of Southern Ireland and delegates and speakers from around the world were given a warm Irish welcome by our hosts at Cork University Hospital.

The main conference began with a half-day Life Long Learning Session on Skull Base neurosurgery led by the British Skull Base Society and included international and UK speakers who updated delegates on all aspects of the specialty.

The afternoon commenced with an excellent opening talk entitled "Cushing and Dandy: two prickly neurosurgical giants" delivered

> by a senior Cork Consultant, Charles Marks. This was followed by a Hot Topic Session the SBNS's latest projects: our new Global Initiative, the Mentoring Scheme for our members,

a talk by the Chair of the BNTA, Marina Pitsika and a Clinical Trial Update by our Academic Chair, Prof. Michael Jenkinson.



Prior to the start of the main conference there was a sub-specialty meeting on Hypermobility related to connective tissue disorders (mainly focusing on Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome) with a view to creating a multidisciplinary national working Group comprising Neurosurgeons rheumatologists and geneticists.

The proceedings of that meeting have now been published in the BJN.

Later that afternoon there was a Spine session which included 9 free papers and a plenary talk entitled "Intraoperative Monitoring, what is it good for?...absolutely nothing!" delivered by Prof Ciaran Bolger. Running in parallel with the Spine session was a Radiosurgery session run by Mary Murphy, from the National Hospital in London. The day ended with an Oral Poster session - we like to give our poster presenters an opportunity to speak in the Lecture Theatre wherever possible.

The Welcome Reception that evening had an Irish theme with local food, Irish dancing and of course Irish whisky tasting! It was an excellent opportunity for our quest speakers, delegates and sponsors to socialise and network.

Thursday morning kicked off with a breakfast seminar, sponsored by Insightec, on "Focused Ultrasound for Movement Disorder" with Mark Radon presenting results and experiences on behalf of the Walton Centre. The rest of the day comprised 8 free paper sessions relating to the following themes - Oncology (x2), Vascular, Trauma, Skullbase, Spine, CSF, and Teaching Training. Four of these sessions were headed up by a plenary talk given by an expert in that particular topic, some of whom had travelled many miles to attend, such as Ramez Kirollos from Singapore, which clearly demonstrates the fantastic commitment from members of the Society to these meetings. It's also important to acknowledge that there were more than 70 free papers presented on this day alone, covering a wealth of information and research to help the advancement of Neurosurgery.

The day's highlights were our two named guest lectures which were delivered by: Ossama Al-Mefty — "Acoustic Tumour: Hear Me" and Russell Andrews — "A Tribute to Sir Geoffrey Jefferson — a Neurosurgical Play in Three Acts".







In the evening the Gala Dinner was held at the famous Cork Gaol where delegates were wined, dined and entertained by the "Sultans of Spine" — a talented band of spinal neurosurgeons who really know how to rock and get everyone on the dance floor.





Following a late evening of entertainment, the Breakfast Seminar started a little later than usual at 9 am. It was given by Professor Noel Fanning, Consultant Neuro Radiologist from Cork, on the topic of Duropathies. He gave his audience a good insight into the valuable work of a neuro radiologist.

The morning continued with more free papers that had been selected from the many excellent abstract submissions. These were divided into two sessions running in parallel. One relating to Paediatrics, which included a plenary talk entitled:

"Re-evaluation of neonatal IVH – some thoughts from Dublin" delivered by Darach Crimmins.

The other was a Miscellaneous session with topical papers such as:

"Gender distribution of invited speakers at major neurosurgical conferences: a retrospective open cohort study" and generating some rather interesting audience engagement!

Later that morning Angelos Kolias, from the University of Cambridge, who was awarded the Royal College of Surgeons' Hunterian Medal for his paper entitled 'Decompressive Craniectomy in Traumatic Brain Injury – strengthening the evidence base', delivered the Hunterian Lecture.

Our final Keynote Lecture was an address by Tánaiste Micheál Martin, the Minster for Foreign Affairs and Defence in Southern Ireland. It was a real honour to have him take time out of his busy schedule to attend our meeting and pay tribute to the neurosurgical staff in Cork for all their hard work and dedication, especially during the pandemic and to talk about his work and his government's plans for investment in the NHS and the medical community.





The afternoon came to a close with a final free paper session on Trauma, providing an opportunity for research studies such as "MAST Trials — Management of Seizures after TBI, an update" and "A randomized Trial of Timing to Restart Direct Oral Anticoagulants after Traumatic Intracranial Haemorrhage (Restart tlCrH)" to be promoted and support potential recruitment.

From the abstracts and posters presented the following prizes were awarded:

Top Oral Presentation Prize was awarded to Rodak Ved for his abstract entitled: Assessing neuroinflammatory signaling in a human tissue model of traumatic brain injury.



The prize for the best oral poster presentation was awarded to Jake Henry for his poster entitled: Risk factor synergism in aneurysmal subarachnoid haemorrhage: A national, prospective cohort study.
